No biographical details are available for Claire Weiss.

Zoe Hart Dyke (1896 - 1975) was a British pioneer of silk farming. The silk created in her businesses has been used by British Royalty including the wedding dresses of Queen Elizabeth II and Diana, Princess of Wales.

Born Millicent Zoe Bond in London's east end, her family moved to Dorset where she grew up & developed an interest in silk worms. In 1922 she married Oliver Hart Dyke

NEW MUSEUM NOW OPEN

The Biggin Hill Memorial Museum is now open. 1921 CENSUS

The National Archives, in association with the Office for National Statistics (ONS), has awarded leading British & Irish family history website Findmypast the contract to digitise & publish the 1921 Census online. The census, which was the first to be conducted following the introduction of the Census Act of 1920, & will be published online in January 2022.

Taken on 19th June 1921, the census consists of more than 28,000 bound volumes of original household returns containing detailed information on close to 38 million individuals. It provides greater detail than any previous census as, in addition to the questions asked in 1911, the 1921 returns also asked householders to reveal their place of employment, the industry they worked in and the materials they worked with as well as their employer's name. Those aged 15 & older were required to provide information about their marital status, including if divorced, while for those under 15 the census recorded whether both parents were alive or if either or both had died. The 1921 Census also included detailed questions on education & was the first in which individual householders could submit separate confidential returns. It is going to be a long 3 years!
