Ian is a retired professional genealogist with over 30 years experience in English research, a former Chairman of and a Fellow of AGRA (The Association of Genealogists and Researchers in Archives) and has published several books related to Family Research.

"BBLHS has one of the most extensive websites of any local history society with many excellent local history resources

There is FREE access for everyone, in line with one of the aims of the society to record and make available a range of material about the Borough of Bromley that might otherwise be lost. We have been able to do this partly through a generous bequest from the late Jean Tresize.

On the Resources pages you will find:

The Annotated Horsburgh: A scanned 1930s copy of ELS Horsburgh's *Bromley from the earliest times to the present century*, with additional pictures and notes. The additions were made by one of the history's instigators, local historian William Baxter. The unique copy has been made available courtesy of Bromley Local Studies Library.

BBLHS journal *Bromleag*: issues from 1974 —2016 are available. There is a full searchable index.

Books: Over 100 books on local, Kent and London history are available via the website including general histories of Bromley, Orpington and Beckenham areas; health reports; parish registers; cycling; railway guides; churches; place names and census material

Street directories: 1839—1940 all areas of the borough

Maps: of Bromley and London

On the Galleries pages are:

Old photos: there are several hundred photographs from around the borough drawn from the collections of members.

Illustrated Articles: longer articles on people and places from around the borough.

On the Index pages: more information on all the different towns and villages that make up the London Borough of Bromley

Kent Archaeological Society

Our events schedule will start on Tuesday **March 9th at 19:30**. Dr Sheila Sweetinburgh will present a talk, followed by live questions and answers, entitled: **Ways of seeing: Christ's life on Faversham's painted pillar**.

"Church wall paintings are frequently the preserve of art historians, but such material culture is also valuable for those who study the lives of ordinary people in the Middle Ages. Here I am going to be looking at Faversham's 'remarkable' 14th-century painted pillar to explore what it may have offered those of the town in spiritual terms, which in turn may help us to understand issues concerning late medieval piety. Additionally, this presentation considers the pillar's creation following a period of conflict in Faversham's history, another aspect of urban life that has parallels elsewhere in the county."

Click on the link below to access the event around 15 minutes before the start. There are no restrictions to this event and there is no need to download any software on a laptop or desktop although the app may give you a better experience. You may be prompted to download the Teams app if your accessing from an Android device, IPad or Mac but there is no need to register for an account.
