George was the son of Priscilla Spooner nee Welch, Mary Ann's second daughter.(1896 - 1966)

Marion writes:

The Welches Together Again By Marion McHardy (Nee Welch)

*I am a new member of NWKFHS, living in Bromley where I grew up. My research includes the **Welch, Gard, and Woolledge** families. My grandmother was from the Gard family who lived and worked in three areas of London, Poplar, Bermondsey and finally Deptford always relying on the Thames for work. The family has a fascinating history going back to Stepney, Limehouse and Poplar.*

Forest Hill, 16 November 1996: the Welch family gathered for another reunion at the Constitution Club, almost all of them were from Deptford where their Nan, Mary Ann Welch, (known as Poll), brought up eleven children between 1895 to 1920. Two of her children were there that evening, Mary Ann b. 1910 (called Edie) and Primrose b.1915 (called Doll).

Sadly, all her eleven children have now passed away, but her memory lives on with her fifty-three grandchildren. I am her very last grandchild born seven years after she died.

At every reunion there would be a table in the middle of the room with a photograph of my grandmother and handwritten family tree from some of her Grandchildren. Even a beautiful long poem about Granny Poll as she was affectionately known by all the family.

That evening I met my cousin Billy who was in his 70s at that time and I was only in my 30s, showing the remarkable age range of the grandchildren. Sadly, over time, there was less interest in the reunions, but I have been able to reconnect with some of my cousins who are also discovering their own family trees.

Mary Ann was devoted to all her children and grandchildren and at age seventy-five she told a local newspaper she wanted to take them all to the seaside in a charabanc. Her final days were spent at her home in Deptford where she passed away in 1954.

I am very proud of my grandmother, and I will write her story as a tribute to her in a future journal edition.

Many thanks to Marion for sending in this interesting article. As someone from a small family - whose grandmothers only had four children, five grandchildren and six great grandchildren between them - I can't imagine the numbers involved in Marion's research! Guest speaker Imogen Corrigan will talk about The Politeness of Princes

The reality of medieval etiquette and table manners.

Punctuality being the politeness of princes, this lecture examines the reality of manners and etiquette in the Medieval period. A far cry from the popular image of appalling table manners, Medieval dining was a minefield of dos and don'ts, many of which were recorded in courtesy books (Teach Yourself How To Be A Gentleman texts).

A rich vein of artistic evidence also survives, bearing out what is written. The lecture deals with the structure of formal banquets and the food eaten as well as how young gentlemen were trained and more everyday advice to women about hygiene and how to conduct themselves.

8 December 10.30am-12.30 Searching Newspapers - Leader David Cufley

Newspapers were the way that local and national news was disseminated. Before radio and television there were newspapers that gave you information about people and events in your ancestor's community.

Before computers and scanners, you had to read every page of the paper archived copies. Now digital images that have done an OCR (optical character recognition) scan allows quick searches web sites like the British Newspaper Archives and London Gazette provide us with papers we may not have previously found.

There are also trade journals and magazines that also give details that may help family and local historians.

The old papers record among their columns, births, marriages, deaths, funerals, coroner's courts, adverts, criminal acts and gossip. This workshop will discuss what is available and how you may find it and hopefully a mention of your ancestors, whether in good or bad news.

NWKFHS Members can also find details on our web pages such as the Ladywell and Brockley Cemetery list.


