Matt says: "I purchased this Carte de Visite recently and wondered if it would be of interest for the email newsletter. Someone has dated it to July 1866 and the sitters are named - though I can't find anyone who fits yet.

It appears to have been taken at the Stanger studio in Sevenoaks, as, although not stamped, the floor and background is identical to others that are.

I wonder if any readers will have a connection to the family?"

I couldn't resist doing a bit of research before I posted Matt's item, but I didn't get much further.

I read the man's name as N L Rutley, and, although there certainly were Rutleys in the Sevenoaks area - freebmd.org.uk has the marriage of an William Rutley and Emily Young in Lewisham June quarter 1857 with their children's births registered in Sevenoaks - I could not find an N L Rutley.

Free Useful Sources of Information - 1

Pam Goddard has let me know of two useful sources which may be useful if your ancestors emigrated to Australia or New Zealand:

"I recently found a wonderful resource which is free and may be useful for people researching in the New South Wales archives in Australia. It is a series of free webinars.

You can register for upcoming ones if you want to stay up late (currently there are 5 in the pipeline). However you can wait until they are on the website and then look at in your own time. I have done a few and they are very good. Currently there are 34 mini webinars (up to about 30 minutes) and 40 more in depth webinars which are longer at 50-60 minutes.

I also found an interesting website in NZ that may interest some people. It relates to a post WW1 scheme for helping children (both boys and girls), of British Seaman who died in in the war. They went out to NZ to learn farm work.

It lists both boys and girls who went to NZ with some basic details including ship and year they travelled. It has some interesting background information as well. The institution was called the 'Flock House'.

Free Useful Sources of Information - 2

29 September (Thursday) Zoom Workshop - Woolwich Arsenal Place and Paper Study with David Cufley 2.30pm to 4.30pm

Please log in a few minutes early, ready for the 2.30pm start.

This is an interactive workshop using documents left to the Society by Ray Fordham.

Ray left a number of documents and databases that he had rescued from the Arsenal when it closed. The final collection we have received are a number of documents and maps relating to the bombing casualties of WW2. Among the files are lists of names without date or source, but they give addresses within the Arsenal boundary.

The idea of this workshop is to discover the sources that may provide more information as to who these people were and what happened to them.

The files also contain a number of lists of the bombs that fell on the Arsenal and the surrounding borough and parishes. The names and location of these casualties will eventually become databases on our web site.

During the workshop these lists will be compared with the names on the address lists.

As this period 1939 - 45 is difficult to research a record of the sources discovered will be produced to help other members of the society in their research.
