

Dartford Branch Talk: *Christmas on the Home Front 1939 - 1945* with Mike Brown Saturday 3 December: Doors Open 9.45am meeting starts 10.30am and will end by 12.30pm

Dartford Science and Technology College, Heath Lane, Dartford Kent DA1 2LY

Mike Brown is an experienced speaker whose TV credits include Time Team and Timewatch. His entertaining, seasonal talk will be enhanced by a collection of artefacts such as ration books, uniforms and toys.

The outbreak of war in 1939 saw the disappearance of many traditional British celebrations. Guy Fawkes' Night went immediately – gunpowder production was needed for the war effort and bonfires contravened the blackout. Summer holidays became a thing of the past and Easter all but disappeared as chocolate – and even real eggs – went 'on the ration'.

In spite of this, the nation remained determined to celebrate Christmas as a time of family and community; a time when war could be set aside, if only for a day.

Drawing upon personal recollections, contemporary Mass Observation reports, newspaper articles, advertisements, and personal and archive photographs, Mike Brown looks at each wartime Christmas on the British Home Front, from 1939 to 1944.

He explores how people celebrated Christmas despite the problems of shortages, rationing, the blackout, Luftwaffe raids and the absence of family members who had been called up or evacuated.

Life in Britain changed dramatically as the war progressed; the annual celebration of Christmas provides fascinating yearly 'snapshots', illuminating the changes over six years of conflict.

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Sevenoaks Branch Talk: The Goose is Getting Fat! The History of Christmas Traditions with Imogen Corrigan

Saturday 10 December Doors open 10.45am meeting starts 11am

Come along and enjoy a quiz and mince pies as well as the talk..

What's behind the Wassail and why do we kiss under mistletoe and let loose women into York at Christmas?

Every family hones its own traditions, but mainly they are based on a central theme: filling our houses with greenery and bling, sending cards, eating too much, wearing a silly hat, singing songs and playing games that we don't bother with for the rest of the year.

How has all this come about? Some are based on pagan festivities that either honoured spirits or simply helped to break up the winter. Others, such as advent calendars and crackers, are much more recent.

This talk cannot possibly cover all of our traditions, but it gives a glimpse behind the scenes to see our ancestors preparing for the day, stirring-up puddings and dragging Yule logs into the house on Christmas Eve and the rituals that went with it. We see Lords of Misrule lording it over rowdy parties, how pantomime developed and how a few carollers sent out a coded message.

When Clare Walker set out to research her husband's ancestors, she never imagined the astonishing stories she would unearth and the many frustrating mysteries that would both enthrall and frustrate her.

She also didn't bargain on the shocks she would have to deliver to her family: ancestors who were executed (they backed the wrong side); murdered in their bed by a best friend; a

missing RAF crewman; a doctor who left his young wife and two small daughters to travel to Australia where he drowned; and a Gaiety Girl who voyaged to South Africa with her wedding dress in her suitcase to marry a "stage-door Johnny"

Clare Walker is a former journalist, author and pilot with over 30 years experience of thrilling audiences with her engaging, entertaining and informative talks on a wide range of topics.

Clare's presentations are highly visual, using rarely seen historical footage, photos and fascinating anecdotes and are based on in depth interviews and research.

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ZOOM Talk: A Grandmother's Legacy with Jenny Mallin



26 January 7.30pm to 9pm

Please log in from 7pm and enjoy a chat amongst attendees beforehand.

Jenny delivers a fascinating insight into five generations of her family who lived during the days of the British Raj in India.

Seen through the eyes of their granddaughter, Jenny captures a period of British history through her PowerPoint presentations with extensive collection of family sepia photographs, and manages to bring her stories to life: her grandmothers' lives as memsahibs and the "legacy" that Jenny has been given, a 170 year old cookbook penned by Jenny's great 4 x grandmother in 1844 when she was aged just 15 and a newlywed bride, married to an English schoolmaster.

Jenny also describes her grandfathers, uncles and relatives who served in the British Army as early as 1798, The Royal Indian Navy, the Railways in Madras, a co-founder of an English Medium School in India in the early 18th century and a great uncle who rose up through the ranks to become Postmaster General in the telegraph industry.

Now a writer, Jenny has had a successful career at the BBC in television production. She lives in Kingsclere, Hampshire with Stewart, her husband of over 30 years, their Westie dog, and their three cats. Any spare time that she has is spent doing painting, home decorating, jewellery making, listening to music, photography and enjoying nature.

Jenny has travelled extensively throughout India and has also visited many other countries, including Hong Kong, Japan, Australia, and America. Her travelogues and written anecdotes of her journeys are much enjoyed by her family and friends.

A collection of talks based on generations of her British Raj Family with fascinating sepia photographs and interesting facts about the history of the infrastructure of India.

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14 December: Zoom Heralds' Visitations Workshop with David Cufley 2.30pm - 4.30pm

Please log in from 2.15pm for the 2.30pm start.

This workshop will look at the Heralds Visitations which were collected and compiled from the 16th century.

From 1530 at intervals of approx. 30 years the Heralds made tours of the country to examine the claims to have arms and had the right to destroy all unlawful arms and crests.

The visitations continued until c1686.

Although some are suspect many are genealogical records of value (quote by Pauline Saul in 'Tracing your ancestors. The A-Z Guide' published by FFHS).

The Harleian Society has printed and published copies of the visitations.
