OUR TALK TODAY, THE 7th JANUARY 2023 TRACING MY ANCESTORS DURING LOCKDOWN

When Clare Walker set out to research her husband's ancestors, she never imagined the astonishing stories she would unearth & the many frustrating mysteries that would both enthral & frustrate her.

She also didn't bargain on the shocks she would have to deliver to her family: ancestors who were executed (they backed the wrong side); murdered in their bed by a best friend; a missing RAF crewman; a doctor who left his young wife & two small daughters to travel to Australia where he drowned; & a Gaiety Girl who voyaged to South Africa with her wedding dress in her suitcase to marry a "stage-door Johnny"

Clare Walker is a former journalist, author & pilot with over 30 years experience of thrilling audiences with her engaging, entertaining & informative talks on a wide range of topics.

Clare's presentations are highly visual, using rarely seen historical footage, photos & fascinating anecdotes & are based on in depth interviews and research.

MEETINGS


Meetings are either held at Dartford or Sevenoaks or on Zoom. They are open to all, but a donation towards the cost of the speaker is welcome from non-members.

NEW & UPDATED COLLECTIONS ADDED TO ANCESTRY

Among the recent new additions to Ancestry's records include East Sussex Electoral Registers, 1706 - 1963 & West Sussex Electoral Registers, 1832 - 1963. Hampshire Wills & Probate records, 1398 - 1858, have been updated as have East Sussex Church of England Births & Baptisms.

Another new addition, & possibly a very useful one, is London Gazettes World War 2 Military Notices, 1939 - 1945.

FIND MY PAST & OTHERS

I'm not a regular user of this website & the only hew record set I could find is Scottish Modern & civil Deaths & Burials, 1855 - 2021.

Don't forget that although most, if not all genealogy websites will have the basics of Births, Marriages, Deaths, & censuses up to & including 1911 after that they will differ. It is always a good idea to regularly search as many of these sites as possible. Both Ancestry & Find My Past can be accessed free of charge at Joydens Wood Library. Another site I use regularly is The Genealogist as it has The Tithe Records, including maps, on it, as well as many other records not on the 2 big sites. Happy searching!

DID YOU KNOW

As I am writing this it is the morning of the 1st of January, New Years Day. Prior to AD43 & throughout the world time was recorded by solar &/or luna observations but each one could be different & most not accurate. In AD43 the Julian calendar was introduced in the Roman Empire & subsequently most of the then known Western world. However it only contained 355 days in a 12 month period so compensations had to be made, different each year. This was done each February by the addition of days in the middle of the month, in essence an additional 13th month. Complicated or what! And it continued to be so.

After centuries of discussion & more accurate research the Gregorian calendar was introduced in 1582, named after Pope Gregory XIII. This simplified the 12 month calendar year & introduced 'leap years' which realigned the calendar with the solar year by 1 day a century.

The reforms were adopted by the Catholic countries of Europe & their overseas possessions, & over the next 300 years by Protestant & Eastern Orthodox countries. Britain & her colonies formally adopted the Gregorian calendar in 1752. This required a correction of 11 days & Parliament decided that Wednesday 2 September should be followed by Thursday 14 September with no intervening days numbered 3 to 13. In addition to this the first day of each year had previously been changed from the 25th March (Lady Day) to the 1st January. So I can now say Happy New Year.
