THE TALK ON JANUARY 6th JANUARY 2024 AT THE DARTFORD MEETING IS BOXERS, BANDITS & A BLIND BEGGAR

Bethnal Green was a medieval hamlet to the east of the City of London long before the term "East End" was invented.

It became popular with rich merchants in the 16th century but immigration began in the 18th century & Bethnal Green soon developed into one of the first manufacturing districts in the area.

By the end of the 19th century foreign immigration had turned Bethnal Green into the over-populated scene of poverty which we find in the census returns. Slum clearance & post war redevelopment swept away most of these communities.

Many of us have ancestors who lived in or passed through the East End of London & his illustrated talk will explain the history of the area and the clues which are left to show how our families lived & worked there.

Ian Bevan is an experienced speaker who has been a regular visitor to our Society over the years.

On the website's Home page there are links to a selection Zoom Workshops Videos. Although I attended many of these workshops when they were face to face at the library pre-Covid, I have decided to revisit some of them to refresh my memory. I picked out David Cufley's Talk of the 18th January 2023 called 'What Makes A Good Family Tree'. I think this could be a good starter for members new to family history & those more experienced who are getting a bit bogged down in paperwork.

I won't go into further details of others as I think is best to login to the website & have a look for yourself.

Providing you are a current society member but don't know how to login, also on the Home page is a button, just under the main photograph, which will take you to a short video explaining how to.

MORE TALKS & WALKS

One of our most popular speakers at meetings is Chris Bull. He is an experience led tour guide & speaker & is a wealth of knowledge of the Gravesend area & a little further afield. Before retiring he was head of Gravesham Libraries & is historical advisor to Swanscombe & Greenhithe Town Council.

His website (<u>christophbull.co.uk</u>) lists the titles of his talks, including some new ones, & his guided walks. I have been on about 4 of his walks which, like his talks, are always very entertaining. Pre-Covid Chris was a regular speaker at society meetings.

On a Monday evening most months Chris also entertains us with a talk at the Reliance Fish Restaurant, Queen Street, Gravesend, where after a fish & chip meal, sausage, pies & chicken etc are also available, he will give a talk. The 11th December's talk is Gravesend in the 1880's, How the modern town we know now began, expanded & developed & is full of details about the buildings we take for granted. I have been many times & can highly recommend both the food & Chris's entertaining talks.
