Dartford Branch February Talk: *British Hospital for Mothers and Babies, Woolwich* with Sue Sauter

Saturday 3 February 2024: Doors Open 9.45am Talk starts 10.30am

Sue Sauter, an ex-midwife and Governor of the Oxleas NHS Foundation Trust, will trace the history of the pre-NHS maternity home and midwifery school.

It started in 1905 with 8 beds and home visits, went through several moves, was bombed during the war, joined the NHS and established one of the Country's first premature baby units before closing in 1984.

At least one of our members was born there and there are surely some more.

The talks venue has a large, free car park but it is shared with other users and can be busy at times.

Sevenoaks Branch February Talk: From Castle to Cardboard, Discovering the History of Eynsford Castle with Rod Shelton

Saturday 10 February 2024 Doors open 10.45am meeting starts 11am Otford Village Memorial Hall 28A High Street, Otford, Kent TN14 5PQ

#### About the speaker:

Rod Shelton is an author, artist and model-maker. He has lived in Otford for 25 years and is active in village matters. Rod is the local historian and chairs the Otford Society. He was a London advertising copy writer; then ran his own commercial film company.

Rod specialises in reproducing homes of historical interest back to the period in which they were first built. This takes much research and reference as well as a fair amount of calculation. His particular interest is in the life of the people who lived there at that time. A large selection of his models of featured places and homes in the Darent Valley are on permanent display at Lullingstone Castle.

#### About the talk:

In this talk, Rod demonstrates and tells of the origins of the castle and how it then evolved over the period to reach its heyday in the 1100s. It tells the story of the influential de Eynsford family and their involvement in the Barons' revolt which led to the fall of Rochester Castle and the loss of Eynsford Castle to King John.

No booking, just turn up. Free to members. A donation towards hall hire and speaker fee is appreciated from visitors.

There is a large public car park (payment required) adjacent to the hall but it can be busy.

# ZOOM Talk with David Cufley 14 February 7.30pm

Sevenoaks to Swanley Railway and the Eynsford Viaduct. Includes navvies and railway worker families.

The railway brickfield at Eynsford provided bricks for the Viaduct and other structures on the line to Sevenoaks.

Thomas Crampton, the railway contractor, became the master brickmaker at the brickfield near the Bat and Ball, Sevenoaks.

These brick railway structures changed the rural settings and provided employment for the labouring workers and their families. Temporary Huts and Shants were built for their accommodation during construction.

The landscape was changed by the embankments, tunnels and cuttings needed to form the railway.

After the completion of the railway, where a siding had been constructed for the railway brickfield it created a new manufactory.

The railway provided access to new markets more than the horse and cart of a rural brickfield could reach. Most of the Navvies and Labourers moved on and the temporary housing was removed in most cases.



# Free (for non Commercial use) Graphics Editing Program



Robert Sear, one of our members, wants to let other enews readers know about this useful free program:

My favourite graphics editing program is Irfanview VERSION 4.66 <a href="https://www.irfanview.com">https://www.irfanview.com</a>

The latest upgrade has a new feature that I find very useful

Irfanview is a small fast free program that I use to crop, label and resize images such as census images and photos for use in my family tree research I can load the program, crop a census image, label it and save and exit before a program such as Photoshop is even loaded.

The new feature allows rotation by 0.1 of a degree instead of the previous 1 degree.

If you have an eye for perfection, this makes a big difference
