TODAYS TALK: A Family at War

The talk includes the difficulties of creating a true historical account when photographs are faked and documents created to deceive.

15 March 2025: The Tidal Thames: It's Folklore & Traditions

Mark is a freelance artist, designer-silversmith, semi-retired university lecturer and public speaker. He is also a folklorist and has been a member of the Folklore Society since 1987, speaking regularly at their conferences around the UK. He has a particular interest in unusual local customs and rituals and in 2013 he published a book on the folklore and popular customs of the church. Furthermore, Mark is passionate about lighthouses, being an active member of the Association of Lighthouse Keepers and is currently their Education Officer. This talk explores the rich tradition of lore and legend around the tidal reaches of London's River, including pagan gods, riverside taverns, secret tunnels, ghosts, ceremonials, frost fairs, tales of smuggling and pirates.

ON THIS DAY

March 1 is the 60th day of the year

1628 – Writs issued in February by Charles I of England mandate that every county in England (not just seaport towns) pay ship tax by this date.

1921 – The Australian cricket team captained by Warwick Armstrong becomes the first team to complete a whitewash of The Ashes, something that would not be repeated for 86 years.

1946 - The Bank of England is nationalised.

1981 – Provisional Irish Republican Army member Bobby Sands begins his hunger strike in HM Prison Maze.

1888 – Fanny Walden, English cricketer and umpire, international footballer (d. 1949)^[21]

1910 - David Niven, English soldier and actor (d. 1983)

OLD OCCUPATIONS

GABELER: Tax collector. A collector of gabels or taxes.

GAGER: An exciseman. Collector of liquor taxes. One who gages (gauges); specifically, an officer whose business is to ascertain the contents of casks and other hollow vessels.

GARTHMAN: The proprietor of an open weir for taking fish. Owner or worker of a fish trap.

GATHERER: Glassworker who inserted the blow iron into the molten glass ready for the blower

GAUGER: Customs duty officer who measured the capacity of imported barrels of liquor in order to calculate

the payable duty

GORZEMAN: A seller of gorse or broom

GRACE-WIFE: Midwife - nurse who delivers babies

GRANGER: Farmer GRIMBRIBBER: Lawyer GROOVER: A miner

GUINEA PIG: (Slang) A person rendering services more or less for a nominal fee of a guinea e.g. company

director, juryman, deputy clergyman, officer on special duty

KENT PLACE NAMES

Bapchild: a name meaning something like 'Bacca's spring'.

Bearsted : does not, sadly, commemorate a time when bears wandered the Kentish woodlands. The general meaning is therefore of a 'village or homestead on a hill'.

Benenden: looks back to an Old English personal name, and denotes a denn or woodland pasture belonging to a man called Bionna.

Bicknor: probably signifies a 'slope below the pointed hill'.

Bidborough: The 'borough' of Bidborough is not Old English burh, a fort or stronghold, but rather beorg, a hill.

Biddenden: is an eponym describing an Old English denn or woodland pasture.

Borden: is either a 'valley near a hill' or a 'woodland pasture near a hill'.

Boxley: takes its name from the box-tree, unchanged from the Old English box.

Bredgar: literally a 'broad triangular plot'.

Brenchley: It describes an Old English leah or woodland clearing,

Burham: is a typical Old English place-name meaning 'homestead by the fortified place'.

Society Library

The Society Library is open every Wednesday for members to do their own research, socialise, participate in library based workshops and discussion groups and receive help from the library volunteers. The library address is 80 Summerhouse Drive, Joydens Wood, Bexley Kent DA5 2EE. Free parking in nearby side roads.

You can use the library's PCs to access Ancestry - and FindMyPast (which currently does NOT include access to the 1921 census, something we are investigating with the library). We suggest joining Kent Libraries as you can then access these websites from your own device whilst in the library which eases pressure on the demand for library PCs.

The library is open from 10am to 4pm but it greatly helps the volunteers if visitors with research queries call in earlier in the day rather than later. Please also bring as much information as you already have about the ancestor you are researching.
