TODAYS TALK : The Tidal Thames: It's Folklore & Traditions

This is an interactive exploration of 'Six Degrees of Separation' - an interactive experiment to find family history links between members and to verify if the 'six degrees of separation' has any relationship to Family History Research.

It will explore the connections members have to each other and how they may be related by genes, place or event. The Laboratory may stimulate members' research and breakdown those brick walls to that elusive ancestor. Serendipity and Kismet are important research tools of family historians and are little used and explored, this laboratory will try to highlight their use.

In 1818 the poet John Keats coughed up blood, and stated "*It is my death warrant*".

ON THIS DAY

April 12 is the 102nd day of the year

627 – King Edwin of Northumbria is converted to Christianity by Paulinus, bishop of York.

1606 – The Union Flag is adopted as the flag of English and Scottish ships.

1831 – Soldiers marching on the Broughton Suspension Bridge in Manchester, England, cause it to collapse.

1937 – Sir Frank Whittle ground-tests the first jet engine designed to power an aircraft, at Rugby, England.

1961 – Space Race: The Soviet cosmonaut Yuri Gagarin becomes the first human to travel into outer space and perform the first crewed orbital flight, Vostok 1.

1981 – The first launch of a Space Shuttle (*Columbia*) takes place: The STS-1 mission.

Births

1792 – John Lambton, 1st Earl of Durham, English soldier and politician, Lord Privy Seal (d. 1840)

1851 – Edward Walter Maunder, English astronomer and author (d. 1928)

1888 – Cecil Kimber, English automobile engineer (d. 1945)

1925 – Oliver Postgate, English animator, puppeteer, and screenwriter (d. 2008)

1930 – Bryan Magee, English philosopher and politician (d. 2019)

1941 – Bobby Moore, English footballer and manager (d. 1993)^[65]

1942 – Bill Bryden, Scottish actor, director, and screenwriter (d. 2022)

OLD OCCUPATIONS

HACK A person who hires himself out for any sort of literary work

HAND FLOWERER Ladies living mainly in rural locations who embroidered flowers or similar designs on muslin or cambric

HANDLE STICKER Put handles on cast ceramic cups, pitchers, etc

HANGER-ON or **HOOKER-ON** or **ONSETTER** Mining industry. Hung corves (originally baskets) on rope at the pit-bottom

HANKYMAN A travelling magician in Victorian/Edwardian England

HECK MAKER A maker of a part of a spinning machine by which the yarn is guided to the reels

HELLIER or **HILLIER** or **HILLARD** A roofer; a tiler or slater.

HIGGLER A person who haggles or bargains or an itinerant dealer, similar to a cadger

HOGGARD Pig drover

HOOKER A worker that hooks or uses hooks e.g. In woolen, cotton industry

HORSE LEECH Veterinarian, farrier

HOWDY or **HOWDIE** A midwife (chiefly used in Scotland)

HUSH SHOP KEEPER Person who brewed and sold beer without a license

KENT PLACE NAMES

Capel le Ferne indicates a chapel in a ferny place.

Chart takes its name from the Old English cert, meaning rough ground.

Chevening may indicate a settlement of 'the dwellers at the ridge',

Chipstead is a distortion of the Old English ceap-stede, literally a 'market-place'.

Cobham traces its name back to an Old English personal name, Cobba, in this case describing his ham, or homestead.

Cowden is literally a denn or pasture for cows, from the Old English cu 'cow'

Cranbrook meaning a 'brook frequented by cranes or herons'.

Crundale An Old English crundel was a chalk-pit or quarry,

Cuxton The X in Cuxton has slightly disguised its etymology, which would suggest a meaning along the lines of 'Cucola's stone'.

Society Library

The Society Library is open every Wednesday for members to do their own research, socialise, participate in library based workshops and discussion groups and receive help from the library volunteers. The library address is 80 Summerhouse Drive, Joydens Wood, Bexley Kent DA5 2EE Free parking in nearby side roads.

You can use the library's PCs to access Ancestry - and FindMyPast (which currently does NOT include access to the 1921 census, something we are investigating with the library). We suggest joining Kent Libraries as you can then access these websites from your own device whilst in the library which eases pressure on the demand for library PCs.

The library is open from 10am to 4pm but it greatly helps the volunteers if visitors with research queries call in earlier in the day rather than later. Please also bring as much information as you already have about the ancestor you are researching.
